Local Businesswoman Helps Stockton Non-profit Get Books for School Kids

Just when California is about to reduce school funding by millions, a California non-profit and a local business gives over 4,400 books to San Joaquin County school children.

Local business owner, Jodie Dale, of Discovery Bay, CA, partnered up with *San Joaquin A+*, a non-profit organization based in Stockton, to help procure over 4,400 books for their Kindergarten Book Bag program. *San Joaquin A+* had donations and grant funds available to purchase nearly 3000 books. Jodie was able to supply Usborne children's books to *San Joaquin A+* and utilize an Usborne 50% grant matching program to provide an additional 1466 free books. This resulted in the ability to furnish 198 kindergarten classrooms throughout San Joaquin County with enough books for each classroom to have a lending library.

The goal of *San Joaquin A+* is to support and enhance the education of the youth of their community. One way their director, Sue de Polo, does this is to promote literacy in that county by using donations and grant money to purchase books and other educational materials for school kids county-wide. *San Joaquin A+* then distributes them to schools and children county-wide.
